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Prison Care Ministries Chairman's Report 2006

We have completed our second year of operation and as with our first year the challenges placed before us were matched by the strength and determination of Geoff and Jill to make a significant difference in the lives of the men and families they are called to work alongside.

We have met the immediate housing needs of released inmates through two houses Prison Care Ministries operates. One situated in Queens Avenue, the other one in Grey Street. Both houses can each support five men comfortably and seven men when an emergency arises. Houses are operated in partnership with the Hamilton Support Accommodation Network (HSAN),

Our key challenge for the first half of the year was to maintain consistent occupancy for both houses. For different reasons occupancy varied during this time causing pressure on time and resources.

Prison Care Ministries decided to review accepting those who were receiving counselling treatment for violent offending. Most of these residents were involved in causing relationship strains in the houses causing other residents to move out or were asked to move on themselves. The review had an immediate positive effect as we moved into the second half of the year as demand for our services increased and each of the houses have been regularly full.

We again ran a weekend camp for released inmates and their families called Camp Breakaway. Run in February it is designed to be a combination of family fun, skills and life education (eg budgeting, finance, home and self management). The camp provides families with an opportunity to enjoy time having fun together; meet with others in similar circumstances and to learn new skills. To almost all the families this is a completely new life experience that encourages and equips them to start to change. This year's program was again successful. The Prison Care Ministries Trustees group has remained unchanged: These people are as follows: Len Caley, Maraenui Taituha, Alex Shepherd, Geoff & Jill McMillan and myself Mike Marama -Te Ahuru.

This work of the ministry has required Geoff and Jill to be working full time. To make this possible the financial support has come from a variety of sources. Geoff & Jill have personal sponsors who donate regularly. We also have received funding from various community trusts. Our expenditure is reliant on the income received and is managed extremely well by Jill. We are very grateful for all support received, without which we could not continue to work with these community groups, trusts and people.

We continue to be encouraged by the partnership formed with the Hamilton Support Accommodation Network (HSAN), which became a part of Prison Care Ministries in our first year. HSAN has its own sub-committee: Anton Roest, Mel Impey, Geoff and Jill Smith and Geoff and Jill McMillan.

Prison Care Ministries were deeply concerned after Geoff suffered a stroke earlier this year. This left Geoff with a recuperation period in hospital for a few weeks followed by rest at home for a few more weeks before returning to work. Geoff and Jill are grateful for all the support received from all over this time.

Our third year will provide challenges on a larger scale as we consider the viability of a third house. Geoff and Jill have made a significant difference in this ministry and in the lives of the people it seeks to assist and as a community we are grateful and excited for their work and how it continues to develop, adapt and evolve.

There are potential future opportunities for Prison Care Ministries as the Corrections Department consider tendering out services of this nature. Accommodation is currently tendered in Auckland and tenders have been called for in Wellington and Christchurch. The trustees would need to review our strategic direction as an organisation as complying with the requirements of a government contract brings new challenges that will change the shape of Prison Care Ministries.

Thank you to all those who have supported Prison Care Ministries and a special thank you to Geoff and Jill McMillan. My faith continues to be strengthened and I am encouraged by this great work you do.

Hamilton Support Accommodation Chairman's Report

My brief report gives a general overview of the assistance and support our committee have tried to provide for the men at our Grey Street and Queen's Ave residential houses over the period 1 September 2005 to 31 August 2006.

During this time, our Support Accommodation Committee has met on a regular monthly basis and discussed the general needs of the men in the houses and the support needed by our full-time social workers Geoff and Jill McMillan. At these meetings Geoff and Jill would bring everyone up to date on what was happening at both the houses and would list the things that needed to be attended to as well as those things needed to provide the best possible social work and practical support for the men in residence. The committee would then follow up with any tasks and goals agreed on. Many things were provided in answer to prayer for these needs.

I understand that Prison Care Ministries had a total of 93 referrals for our support accommodation in the last year. Out of that number we have been able to provide quality accommodation, care and support for 33 men on their release from prisons throughout New Zealand. At present we have three residents in each house who all seem to get along well together.

There has been less of a turnover this year as we have been able to be more selective. The guys have tended to settle in better and stay for longer. There are fewer conflicts amongst the men but the problem of breached agreements (mainly due to use of cannabis) is still an ongoing problem we continue to monitor. We have unfortunately had to ask some men to leave because of this.

As the work of Prison Care Ministries has become more widely known, especially by the Justice Department, there has been an increase in requests to provide support accommodation. There have been times when we had no more spare beds left. Right now Prison Care Ministries have a waiting list of men wanting accommodation when they are released from prison. With the increase in demand, we are now on the lookout for a third support house. During the year the rent was increased for the Hamilton East house. This resulted in raising the resident's rent a further \$20 per week. This house is not all that ideal for a number of reasons but it is in a very handy location and the men very much like it there.

As everyone knows, we were all very shocked to hear of Geoff McMillan's stroke on April the first. We were all left wondering about the significance of it happening on that day. However, we are all very thankful for answered prayers. Some of us were doubtful he was going to make it through. But we know that our God is a God of miracles. We are very grateful and thankful for all those who prayed and for the extra support given during that time. With Geoff out of commission for a while, things slowed down a bit in terms of forward planning but we're all back on track now ready to do what needs to be done next.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Geoff and Jill Smith for taking excellent care of the financial side of things and providing us with up to date accounts. I would also like to thank Major Mel Impey (Salvation Army Court and Prison Officer) who has been attending our meetings and supporting the work. I would also like to thank Steve Stoner for his time and support of our meetings plus the work he does in the background to support our service to the men. I also appreciate the Probation service for their interest and support. I would also like to thank the Prison Care Ministries Trust Board members for their ongoing support of this very worthwhile ministry to the men we all serve in Jesus name.

Finally I want to take this opportunity to thank Geoff and Jill McMillan for their enduring patience, mercy and compassion, their tireless commitment and sacrificial giving in so many ways to this worthwhile and important ministry. It would be interesting to know just how many crimes, victims and re-offending have been prevented in the Hamilton community because of the existence and work of Prison Care Ministries.

Staff report

We have had it on our heart for some time now to train others to join with us in this wonderful ministry. Our attitude is that this ministry should not be limited to just us. In ministry we should always be trying to do ourselves out of a job, but there is never a lack of something to do in the Lord's work! We should always be bringing others "on stream" and training them up.

This ministry is very much relational, the trust and openness with the men does not just happen. It is often begun while the resident is in prison. Trust is gained after long periods of watching to see if your actions match up with your words. We have learned to "wear our hearts on our sleeves" which means that we have to be available at a moments notice to help deal with felt needs.

The stroke in April has really clarified this need to us. We need to bring others on board. At present too much "hangs on us", well really the Lord is the center and powerhouse of this ministry, and that was also shown during the "stroke affair". We have also learned that we are not indispensable, but it would be great to have others alongside us.

Often we have felt burdened with too many applications for the number of beds available, but each time the Lord has it worked out. Previously, we resisted opening a new house until we had some staff to help carry the workload. Recently the Lord has pushed us the other way, i.e., open a house and the Lord will provide the staff.

We have been given permission by the trust board to open a new house, as things line up! This will be done in conjunction with CPS, (Community Probation Service), who will assist in checking out a suitable house. Recently Geoff and a Probation Officer went to check out a house, only to find it had been signed up 5 minutes prior to our arrival!

We need others to assist – with time to build relationships. We have an ex-prison Chaplain available to start taking regular Bible Studies for us, and he is well able to relate to our men. We need folk like this, with experience, and with a heart!

We wish to thank the Trustees and the HSAN Committee who give us so much support and encouragement.

Lawrence Jenson from Family Start speaking on relationships. Lawrence had an hour and half time slot from 9am to 10.30 but had the families full participation and they asked him to continue. We were able to change the program around and he continued on a more personal note with families sharing in a more personal way within the group until lunch time.

Robyn Jackson who focused on health issues and how to care for ourselves. Robyn is a naturopath and had some no cost natural ways of staying healthy. Did you know that dandelion leaves clean out your liver?. Robyn also had an extension of time. The adults were good participants and were open to sharing some of their personal experiences.

The Children's program was taken by Shane Vink from Open Air Campaigners who built a good positive relationship with the children.

This is the first time camp had specifically had released prisoners attending and it was great to see the interaction of families. For some fathers it was hard to get in and have some fun doing messy games with their children.

Herald Series

Our Idle Jails Simon Collins NZ Herald February 2006

Prison Care Ministries was approached by Simon to have some input into a week long series in the NZ Herald on prison life and reintegration.

We approached some families we were currently supporting and the residents of one of our support houses. These men thought quick and offered to share their stories with Simon for a meal of KFC. Simon paid up and a round-table discussion was held over a meal which was a treat for them. We preferred to remain anonymous throughout this publication.



Men's Accommodation Group Researched by Patrick Calnan Department of Psychology University of Waikato

Prison Care Ministries have been one of ten Hamilton Agencies who have been meeting over the past year. Agencies included both Government and Non Government. All have a concern for the number of men in Hamilton who are homeless. A researcher was approached, a funding grant gained and interviews were held with agencies and homeless men. Prison Care Ministries took part in this

research and is seen as one of four main providers of accommodation in Hamilton

Non government agencies carry large responsibilities and risks in terms of management and care of men, yet receive very little or no support whatsoever for the services they offer from central or local government. Funding is a problem.

A draft of this research has been presented. It is only the beginning Quote from Prison Care Ministries: "Not enough people [tenants] create the problem of meeting expenses and too many people create interpersonal problems among the

From Prison.....

During the year we visited 57 men in Waikeria of which 28 were applying for accommodation, and a further 29 for one on one support.

It is exciting to see the response of these men to the "positive". So much in their lives is negative and soul destroying that they are hungry for anything that is uplifting in their lives. We are grateful for the opportunities we have to minister to lives like this, to be able to offer something that builds up people instead of pulling them down.

There are very real relationships developed that will last the test of time. Men have learned to open their hearts to our demonstrated love, and have made an effort to trust. To be able to trust again is a big step for many, as all this has done in the past is bring on hurt and pain. We have been able to teach them that to love means to be vulnerable, but it always brings its rewards.



....To Release

The van arrives at the Hamilton Travel Centre three times a week and we continue to give support to the men and women who are dropped off at the centre on their release. They are appreciative of the help in getting their bus tickets to their town of destination, or if they live in Hamilton a ride home.

Many have taken up the invitation to come to the office to make phone calls home and a coffee while waiting for their bus to depart. Thanks to Robbie at the coffee shop (Travel Café) for supporting us and the men. A coffee is a treat as many have never had coffee in prison (you have to pay for it) but a cappuccino is even better.

We also thank Barnabas Centre in Tauranga (a Ministry of Prison Fellowship) for meeting the bus from Hamilton and supporting those going to Tauranga and need to be met or helped.

.....To the Community

We have had input into the lives of several people in the community.

They represent:

- 7 couples where one member has been in prison.
- 8 past support accommodation residents,
- 6 individuals who have family members in prison
- 4 released prisoners in Hamilton

After a year we are still in touch with a past resident, he has proudly shown us around his work in Tauranga and regularly visits us.

..... To Support Accommodation

All those referred from Waikeria Prison received at least one visit from Prison Care Ministries prior to their release. Many we met with several times.

Two men from Rolleston Prison were escorted up to Hamilton for a meeting prior to their release.

Five men walked into our office looking for accommodation

The office
